





SPRING 2 2022 NEWSLETTER



At last, there is a bit more of a hint of Spring in the air, with daffodils revealing their yellow trumpets!

The theme for this year's British Science Week (11-20 March) is 'Growth'. This theme is very versatile covering anything from plant growth and animal life cycles, through to personal growth.

So we have adopted the theme of 'Growth' for this edition of our outdoor learning newsletter!

School gardens offer children the chance to get involved in growing food – a skill that will last them a lifetime. They're a great teaching resource too, with many opportunities to link into the school curriculum. Children are far more likely to eat fruits and vegetables they've grown themselves – a great reason to get them involved in the process! Choose crops that are robust, easy to grow and - crucially - ready to harvest during term time!

The <u>RHS Campaign for School Gardening</u> website has plenty of advice and information and growing projects to help you start growing things in your school grounds. This handy <u>growing and activity calendar</u> helps you to plan activities throughout the school year.

Easy things to grow include:

• Fat pea and bean seeds are easy for children to handle and grow. They also love setting up supports and, of course, picking the pods. At the same time, grow some peas or beans in plastic bags so children can clearly see germination happening.



- Potatoes are fun to sprout (chit) before planting into potato sacks, containers or beds. Children love the hands-on growing process and unearthing the potatoes – nature's very own treasure hunt!
- Salad crops such as lettuce leaves and radishes are quick growing as well as being perfect for growing in pots to take home.
- Winter squash and pumpkins can be planted out at the end of spring and will be nearing maturity when the children return to school from their summer holidays. How about holding a pumpkin-carving competition?
- Child-friendly fruits include strawberries in raised beds and planters, plus all manner of fruit trees for an autumn harvest.
- Flowers and herbs help to attract bees, butterflies and other wildlife into the school garden. Children will love the splash of colour they give too. Annual flowers are quick growing and should start blooming before the summer holidays look at calendula and nasturtiums.







Frogspawn

February and March is the time of year that frogspawn and toadspawn starts to appear. If you are lucky enough to have a school pond, then keep an eye out for it just below the surface of the water in, especially amongst reeds by the water's edge. It is a fun activity to visit each day with your class to monitor how the spawn is developing. Once the tiny tadpoles have hatched it takes them around 14 weeks for them to grow to become a frog and slightly longer for toad tadpoles.





If you are lacking a pond then <u>this activity</u> from the RSPB can help you build a mini-pond providing a home for frogs, toads, dragonflies, pond-skaters etc. Hopefully you will be able to attract some frogs to spawn in your pond.

It is not illegal in the UK, to collect and raise frogspawn belonging to the common frog (*Rana tempororia*), or toadspawn from the common toad

(*Bufo bufo*). There are a few other frog, toad and newt species in the UK, so make sure you're collecting the right spawn. You should return the froglets to where you found them, as moving frogs between different ponds increases the risk of spreading disease or invasive, non-native plants. This is a <u>useful guide</u> from the Young People's Trust for the Environment (<u>YTPE</u>), for caring correctly for frogs spawn and toadspawn.

Growth Mindset

Of course Growth doesn't have to mean just growing things. A 'Growth Mindset' is a way of thinking, learning and taking on challenges. A child with a Growth Mindset pushes themselves outside of their comfort zone and shows resilience and perseverance. Studies show that it is people with a growth mindset are more successful and are happier. Of course, this is exactly what we want for all our children.

Outdoor play and outdoor learning activities are ideal for helping children to discover, understand and practise developing a Growth Mindset. They can help children to make the transition from "I just can't do it" to "I can't do it yet, but I can learn and improve if I persevere."

This <u>health and wellbeing booklet</u>, that was developed by Natural Resources Wales, helps children reconnect with the natural environment, through 14 activities and games set outdoors. The activities in it can support children in developing a growth mindset.

Time to Observe and Record - Signs of the Season


Have you seen your first butterfly or swallow of spring? The first snowdrop of this season was recorded on 1 January!

Whilst you are out and about in your school grounds, garden or local area, take some time to observe and record your sightings on the **Nature's Calendar** to help the **Woodland Trust** track the effects of weather and climate change on wildlife near you. You'll be contributing to a long biological record that dates back as far as 1736!

Nature's Calendar records contribute to the UK's largest phenology database. Phenology is the study of seasonal changes in plants and animals from year to year. The plants, animals and fungi you can record have been selected to help understand how nature is affected by weather and climate change. Download the <u>phenology calendar</u> to see what species to look out for based on the time of year.

Free Activities and Resources



Local School Nature Grants are back for 2022!

<u>Local School Nature Grants</u> will return this year. Thanks to the support of players of People's Postcode Lottery, <u>Learning Through Landscapes</u> will be expanding their offer to help 900 schools and Early Year settings across England, Scotland and Wales. Applications open from 22 March 2022.

This outdoor learning grant fund has two elements – a fully funded outdoor learning training for your staff and £500 of equipment for outdoor learning. They are available to all schools. Early years providers must have at least 5 staff and a building – either stand alone or part of a school.

ReNature Grants - up to £150 for schools

Your school could get a £150 grant for pupil-led action that helps to ReNature your school grounds or nearby green space (or soon to be green space). All state-maintained schools with more than 10% pupils eligible for Free School Meals and who are inside the South Downs National Park or within 10km of the South Downs National Park boundary are eligible to apply.



Applications will be accepted between 1 March and 8 April 2022 for activity to take place in the Summer Term 2022. Applications will be prioritised on a first-come-first-served basis. Find the full details on the <u>ReNature School Grants</u> webpage.



Free Online Teacher Training

The **South Downs National Park** are holding a series of online **free twilight sessions**, to help you take learning outside and link your curriculum with the local landscape.

Sessions focus on: nature connection, delivering specific curriculum subjects and topics, school grounds development, using woodland effectively, fieldwork skills and health and wellbeing.

British Science Week will take this place this year from 11-20 March 2022.

The theme of the packs is 'Growth', and this covers all sorts of different topics, from growing plants and construction (think spaghetti and marshmallows), to economic growth and understanding the growing need to adapt in the face of climate change. There are free <u>activity packs</u> available with activities designed for Early Years learners, Primary pupils and Secondary students.

In the packs, you will also find details of the **BSW Poster Competition**, also themed around 'Growth'. The poster could explore a tadpole's journey into a fully grown adult frog, or look at the ways population growth is affecting the planet. For further inspiration, there are some sign-posted activities in the activity packs where you could find some ideas, just look out for the paintbrush.

The entries are categorised by age group, with a winner and runner up for each of the four age groups. The deadline for entering the competition is 5pm on the 15 April 2022.

Finally, to celebrate British Science Week, the National Farmer's Union (NFU) are hosting lessons all about different types of farming –

Live From the Farm!

There are three lessons across Science Week for Key Stages 1 and 2. The lessons are 30-45 minutes, and are completely free to join (although registering for an account in advance is required)!

- Monday 14 March 'Life cycles live' (maybe even see some lambs being born!).
- Tuesday 15 March 'Fantastic minibeasts and where to find them.'
- Thursday 17 March 'Climate Change Superheroes'.









Why not follow these lessons up with a class visit to a real farm?

The Countryside Classroom has a search function on its places to visit page, where you can find farms locally to your school which run education programmes and school visits.







FREE Chalk Stream Sessions for Schools

If you're a school in north or central Hampshire (Andover, Whitchurch, New Alresford and the surrounding areas) you can explore your local chalk stream with the <u>Watercress and Winterbournes Landscape Partnership</u>
<u>Scheme</u>, which is supported by the National Lottery Heritage Fund.





The education sessions are available all year round and they are designed to be flexible: some stand alone, while others combine to form a more in-depth learning experience. You could liven up a class or assembly with an interactive talk that takes you on a journey from source to sea or visit your local stream to dip for wildlife and hunt for heritage features.

Sessions are FREE but could be enhanced further with a visit to a mill, water meadow, or watercress farm for a small cost. If your session involves travelling to one of the streams, then we can offer up to £150 towards your transport costs.

Outside of the Scheme Area?

<u>Wessex Rivers Trust</u> offers river education sessions throughout West Hampshire. We run interactive activities in assemblies, riverbank sessions and classroom sessions. These are ideal to link with topic work and support teachers getting their class outdoors and doing something different. To find out more visit the <u>education website</u>.



The John Muir Award



John Muir (1838 –1914) was the Scots-born founding father of modern conservation and the inspiration behind national parks.

The <u>John Muir Award</u> is a UK-wide environmental award scheme. It encourages people to connect with, enjoy and care for nature, landscape, and the natural environment. The Award is free, open to all backgrounds and is suitable for upper primary school and above. It's great to run with Year 6 post-SATs!

Rewilding the Mind

A therapeutic nature-based 6/8-week provision for young people in Hampshire.



Hampshire Outdoors Skills & Participation



Wildlife-rich environments and fresh air has proven benefits that supports young people to feel better emotionally and mentally, as well as contributing to their physical wellbeing. 'ReWilding the Mind' focuses on nature connection and personal care using a blend of holistic and physical nature-based activities, whilst promoting pro-conservation behaviours to support the local wildlife. This programme is suitable for secondary aged young people who have been impacted by Covid and are experiencing mental health issues.



Set amongst the beautiful woodlands of the New Forest, interventions are delivered at Minstead Study Centre in Lyndhurst. The study centre is on a five-acre site with an old Victorian School. Here, the young people will find sheep, chickens and an extensive garden filled with fruit, vegetables, herbs and plants.

Young people will be able to find a place to focus on their wellbeing in small groups over 6-8 sessions, lasting 2 – 3 hours, with the support and encouragement of our experienced Outdoor Practitioners.

They will partake in such activities as, bushcraft, outdoor cooking, yoga and mindfulness, exploration, creative arts, interaction with animals, gardening, practical conservation, walking in nature and music.



In discussion with educational staff, our practitioners will create a person-centred group programme that will focus on various areas of support incorporating the 5 Pathways to Nature Connectedness – a set of results-based actions developed by the University of Derby which has proven benefit to wellbeing and improving mental health.

Our 'ReWilding the Mind' well-being programmes aim to ensure that each young person who attends has defined outcomes, objectives, techniques, and support for a long-lasting impact on their well-being.

Living Streets' Year Round Walk to School Challenge

<u>Living Streets' Walk to School</u> campaigns have been running for over 20 years, encouraging millions of pupils across the UK to travel actively to school. They work closely with the HCC's Travel Planning Team to help encourage students to travel actively when possible.

WOW (Walk Once a Week) is a badge-incentivised project that encourages students to travel actively to school to reduce cars at school gates in the morning. This programme is available to **primary-level schools for free** and there is also additional support via Living Streets that can be provided which may include: setting up a Park and Stride, School Route Audits to identify barriers to walking in your local area, Strider (Living Streets' mascot) visit or events and competitions to promote walking.



Congestion, road safety and localised air pollution may be key issues affecting local communities. WOW aims to help with addressing these problems and at the same time support pupils' physical and mental health. With 6,500 schools in Britain (educating 2.6 million children) being based in areas where fine particles in the air exceed WHO recommended limits, it's time to act to revert these figures. On average, WOW schools see a 30% reduction in car journeys to school and a 23% increase in walking rates.
